Genealogy vs. Family History

- **Genealogy** is the retrieval of vital and familial data from records of various types, and its ordering into meaningful relationship patterns.
- **Family History** is the integration of this data with social, economic, political contexts to develop a narrative.

Genealogical Proof Standard

- 1. Reasonably exhaustive research
- 2. Complete, accurate citations to the sources or sources of each in each information item
- 3. Tests- through processes of analysis and correlation –of all sources, information items, and evidence
- 4. Resolution of conflicts among evidence items
- 5. Soundly reasoned, coherently written conclusion

Original vs. Derivative Sources

- **Original sources** are original documents or copies of the document.
- **Derivative sources** have taken the original documents and transcribed, extract, or abstracted the source opening it to error.

Primary vs. Secondary information

- **Primary** is information created at the time of the event
- Secondary is information created at a later time which opens it up errors

In Kentucky, really started in 1911
Some pre-1911 do exist
Index online at Ancestry.com
100-year moratorium on the release of Kentucky birth certificates
BUT none have been released

Marriage Certificates

In Kentucky 1785-1979 is online at FamilySearch

KDLA and KHS have some on microfilm

Intentions of Marriage

- o Marriage Banns
- Marriage Bond –the surety is usually a relative of the bride.
- o Applications and licenses the most common types of records showing intent to marry.
- Consent Papers when the bride or groom are underage. (Know the law in time and place)

Marriage Records

- Certificates
- Returns may hear them called Ministers Returns
- Personal records of the minister

Death Certificates

In Kentucky, Death Records 1852-1964 online at Ancestry.com 50-year moratorium on Death Certificates

Census Records

72-year moratorium on US Federal Census

1950 will be released April 2022

Taken every 10 years starting in 1790

- Early census 1790-1840 are tick marks only with head of house listed
- 1850 -1870 –everyone named but relationships not given
- 1880 starts to show relationships
- 1890—destroyed by water damaged when the upper floors burned
- 1900-1940—lots of really good info
