Strangled to Death in Motel

Woman Is Slain In Fairfax Motel

Fairfax County police are investigating the slaying of a Richmond area woman, who was found strangled Saturday morning in a room at the Holiday Inn at Tyson's Corner.

The woman, identified as Mrs. Mona Abney, 25, was found by a maid, police said. Police would only say that she had been strangled, and declined to release information on what means had been used.

Police said that the door to Mrs. Abney's room had not been forceably opened, but said there were signs of a struggle within the room.

Police were unable to furnish an address for the woman.

Ex-Resident Strangled

She rarely, if ever, drove to Washington, D.C., from her Richmond home to go shopping.

But last Friday Mona Abney, formerly of Martinsville, checked into the Holiday Inn opposite Tysons Corner Shopping Center in Fairfax — alone — on what her husband has told police was an overnight shopping trip.

A hotel maid discovered her "partially clothed" body about 9 a.m. Saturday, according to Fairfax County police. Mrs. Abney's room and belongings were "in disarray," and marks on her neck suggested what an autopsy at Fairfax Hospital confirmed later on Saturday — she had been strangled to death.

Police have several suspects in the apparent murder, but have not made any arrests yet, according to Marge Besant, spokesman for Fairfax police.

A 1970 graduate of Martins-

ville High School, Mrs. Abney had relatives in Washington, "but she didn't ever go up to visit them," said her father, Horace E. McDaniel Sr., of 704 Ailcie St. "I'd never known her to go on a shopping trip up there," he added.

Mrs. Abney's husband, Wilbert, told McDaniel that Mrs. Abney, 25, telephoned her husband in Richmond about 6 p.m. Friday after checking into the Holiday Inn to say that she was "okay," McDaniel said. Later, Abney also said that a maid at the hotel had given a key for Mrs. Abney's room to an unidentified man, McDaniel said.

In addition, the dead woman's husband also told her father that Mrs. Abney had "about \$300 on her" on the trip, McDaniel said. "She don't usually carry much money on her, usually she just

carries a lot of credit cards," her father said.

Fairfax police could give no information this morning about any possible theft of anything from Mrs. Abney's hotel room, nor could the police spokesman, Mrs. Besant, specify what clothing Mrs. Abney was wearing when she was found Saturday morning.

Mrs. Abney intended to return home on Saturday, according to McDaniel. The Abneys lived at 944 Lisson Crescent in Richmond, said Mrs. Besant.

After graduating from Martinsville High School Mrs. Abney attended Virginia Union College in Richmond, McDaniel said. She and her husband, who attended Virginia State University in Petersburg, met in Richmond. They were married in 1974, the same year Mrs. Abney graduated from Virginia Union, her father said.


Murder Remains Unsolved

No progress has been made in solving the Jan. 26 murder of a former Martinsville resident in Fairfax County, according to police.

Mona Abney, 25, a 1970 graduate of Martinsville High School, was strangled to death in January in her hotel room in Tysons Corner while on an overnight shopping trip to Washington, D.C., from her Richmond home.

The daughter of Horace E. McDaniel Sr. of 704 Ailcie St., Mrs. Abney's 'partially clothed' body was found in the Holiday Inn on Jan. 27 by a maid, according to Marge Besant, spokesman for Fairfax police.

The murder is the only unsolved case among eight murders this year in Fairfax County, Mrs. Besant said.

Wife's Murder Sparks Insurance Claim Disputes

Man Sues To Collect Disputed Insurance

RICHMOND (AP) — A trial date of Nov. 29 has been set for a federal court suit centering on the validity of an insurance policy that names as beneficiary the husband of a 25-year-old Richmond woman who was strangled in a Northern Virginia motel.

Fairfax County police are continuing an investigation into the death of Mona Lisa Abney, whose body was found by a maid last Jan. 29 at the Holiday Inn at Tyson's Corner. The woman apparently was alone when she checked in the night before, police said.

Wilbert Abney Jr. has filed the suit in U.S. District Court seeking the payment of \$200,000 by New York Life Insurance Co. Court records show the disputed life insurance policy was dated about two weeks before Mrs. Abnev's death.

Challenging the validity of the policy, New York Life said — among other things — that Abney "may have committed or caused to be committed the murder of his wife."

Police said no one has been charged in the death.

The case is still open, said Capt. James Joseph, head of the criminal investigation division of the Fairfax police, but he declined to discuss details of the investigation.

A lawyer for the company said only that the "pleadings (in the civil suit) have not been withdrawn."

Man Admits Taking Company's Lie Test In Wife's Death

RICHMOND (AP) — Wilbert Abney Jr., in documents filed in U.S. District Court here, has disclosed that he was given a lie detector test in connection with his wife's death.

"The examiner told me he didn't think I was lying," Abney said.

However, he said he had never been formally given the results of the test.

Abney has filed a suit against New York Life Insurance Co. in an effort to collect on a \$200,000 life insurance policy dated two weeks before the January death of his 25-year-old wife, Mona Lisa Abney.

New York Life, in responding to the suit, said Abney "may have committed or caused to be committed the murder of his wife."

The trial on the lawsuit is scheduled in U.S. District Court here Nov. 29.

Mrs. Abney's slaying has never been solved. Her body was found in a motel room at Tyson's Corner Jan. 28. An autopsy showed she had been strangled.

Perjury Charge Likely in Insurance Suit

RICHMOND (AP) — Either Wilbert Abney Jr. or the parents and sister of his slain wife today face the possibility of a perjury charge in connection with their testimony in a \$200,000 civil suit here.

U.S. District Judge Robert R. Merhige Jr. raised the question of perjury after he questioned Abney about the whereabouts of his wife in the latter part of December 1977.

Merhige said "somebody told a lie" and he turned the matter over to the FBI for investigation.

Merhige's action came Thursday at the conclusion of the two-day trial in which Abney is seeking \$200,000 from New York Life Insurance Co.

Abney, a former New York Life agent, says the company wrongfully refused to pay the proceeds of a policy on his wife's life.

New York Life has challenged the validity of the policy, which Abney obtained five days before Mona Lisa Abney, 25, was robbed, raped and strangled in a Northern Virginia motel room in January.

Abney won a partial victory when Mer-

hige dismissed contentions by New York Life that Abney had participated in a prearranged murder.

He has admitted he was having an affair with another woman and the woman has testified she spent the night with Abney the night his wife was killed. Abney said his wife had gone to Northern Virginia on a shopping trip.

He already has collected \$80,000 from other policies on his wife.

New York Life has filed a \$260,000 countersuit against Abney that will be tried later.

The department selects a "Crime of the Week" from its file of unsolved cases.



FAIRFAX — Fourteen years after a hotel maid found the body of Mona Lisa Abney of Richmond, county police said one person has come forward with new information about the January 1978 death.

An unknown person who called the county's CrimeS-toppers number in early August may have information about the killing, said Officer Cindy Carroll.

The caller "named a person they said killed a black female in a motel six-and-a-half years ago in Tysons Corner." The caller thought the victim was from the Hampton Roads area, Carroll said.

A check of the records showed the only case matching the caller's information — except for the date of the crime and the residence of the victim — was Mrs. Abney's.

The victim was raped, robbed and strangled in her room at the Tysons Corner tact Holiday Inn. No one was who ever charged with the case.

The death of the 25-year-old woman triggered a twoyear court battle between the victim's husband and an insurance company. The husband, an insurance salesman, had taken out \$200,000 in insurance on his wife a week before her death.

Wilbert Abney Jr.'s claim to insurance money finally was rejected by a federal court. The court ruled the insurance application contained inaccurate information about Mrs. Abney's medical history, including a recent abortion. Testimony also showed that Abney had forged his wife's signature to the application.

Carroll said police were interested in talking with the caller again.

The caller said he thought the person involved in the killing was a drug-user and lived with his mother in Richmond, the officer said.

Carroll said she is in contact with Richmond police, who also are working on the case.

Husband surrenders in killing of wife 27 years ago


FAIRFAX, Va. — Twenty-seven years after his wife was found strangled in a Tysons Corner hotel, a husband surrendered to police Tuesday and was charged with her murder.

Mona Lisa Abney, 25, was visiting from Richmond when her body was discovered on Jan. 28, 1978, in her room at a Holiday Inn. The case went unsolved until detectives from the Homicide Cold Case Unit took a renewed interest.

"They reopened the case. They re-interviewed everyone, went over all the past reports," said Mary Mulrenan, a spokeswoman for the Fairfax County Police Department. They also recently sent DNA from the crime scene to a lab for new analysis, and a match came up.

Police said all of this led them to Abney's husband, Wilbert Abney Jr., 55, who turned himself in at police headquarters and was ordered held without bond.

Mulrenan declined to discuss a motive.

Another police spokesman said the couple lived together at the time of the killing. Abney most recently was living in Plymouth Meeting, Pa., a Philadelphia suburb.

"He was fairly cooperative with our investigation, although he was somewhat surprised that the police are reinvestigating a case from 1978," Fairfax Police Detective Steve Milefsky "HE WAS fairly cooperative with our investigation, although he was somewhat surprised that the police are reinvestigating a case from 1978."

told WRC-TV in Washington, D.C., which ran a story about the case earlier this month.

During the initial investigation, a hotel maid told police she let a man into Mona Lisa Abney's room about an hour after she checked in. The maid described the man as looking like the late actor Brian Keith, best known for the TV series "Family Affair."

Wilbert Abney looks nothing like Brian Keith.

"I don't know what the story is there, whether she was mistaken, got the room wrong or what have you. But that turned out to not be the murderer in this case," Mulrenan said.

Jury convicts Abney in '78 death of wife

A Fairfax County jury has found a man guilty of first-degree murder in the 1978 death of Mona Lisa Abney, a former Martinsville resident, and he will be formally sentenced May 5, officials

According to a Washington Post article, the jury was not swayed by Wilbert Abney Jr., 56, and his explanation that his wife died accidentally during rough sex. He was convicted after two days of jury deliberations last week.

Mona Lisa Abney was 25 when she was found strangled in a room at the Holiday Inn in Tysons Corner on Jan. 27, 1978.

Last year, the Fairfax County Police Department was led to her husband by DNA evidence in the case, which was reopened by a cold case unit. Police said Abney turned himself in last May.

The Washington Post reported Abney faces a sentence between 20 years to life in prison.

Abney murder case becomes subject of crime show

PETERSBURG — More than 28 years after the death of former Petersburg resident Mona Lisa Abney, her husband has been brought to justice, arrested and earlier this year was found guilty of her murder. But just how did that happen?

On Jan. 27, 1978, Wilbert Abney Jr., a former Petersburg Police officer, had traveled from Richmond to Tysons Corner in Fairfax County where his wife had gone to do some shopping. It was at a Holiday Inn there that he killed his wife.

For 28 years the case had remained unsolved.

Then in 2005 Wilbert Abney was arrested after testing confirmed that semen found at the scene matched his DNA.

And on Nov. 18 the case will be featured on the A&E television program, "Cold Case

The program, which examines cold cases from across the country, recently talked to those who were involved in the case and who knew the Abneys.

One of those who was interviewed for the program was Patricia Parker, a Prince George resident.

"We were all friends and lived in the same apartment complex," Parker said. "We had fun together and went out places together. Mona [Abney] was just a very sweet girl."

Parker said that while Mona Lisa Abney was sweet and somewhat quiet, her husband was anything but that.

"He was kind of a show-off."

Then she started to remember some other strange statements that he had said to her.

"I remembered that he had always said that if Mona died he would use the insurance money to buy a Rolls-Royce," Parker said. Parker wasn't the only one

who heard Wilbert Abney make such statements before or after his wife's death. Michael Clark drove Abney to Fairfax from Richmond the morning after Mona's murder. During a trial in Fairfax on March 15, Clark testified that Wilbert Abney had said he was going to use the insurance money to buy 12 custom-tailored suits, a Rolls-Royce and a

Fairfax Detective Steve Melifsky said that despite Wilbert Abney's suspicious behavior 28 years ago, it wasn't until DNA testing could confirm he had been at the crime scene that he was arrested.

"One of the biggest problems was the red herring of a maid's statement from the hotel that she had seen a white man leaving the hotel room,' Melifsky said. "[Wilbert] also claimed that he hadn't been to Fairfax on the night that Mona was killed."

Melifsky said that in 1996 the case had been reviewed but that detectives in the Fairfax cold cases unit had worked on several other cases.

cold cases unit and we went through all the cases here and found all the ones with DNA and we started sending evidence off to the lab," Melifsky said. "In 2004 we tested the DNA from the Abney case against two suspects who were already listed in the case and it came back negative. So we decided to go back to the husband."

Since the crime, Wilbert Abney had moved to Pennsylvania. Melifsky contacted him there and asked if he'd be willing to submit a DNA sample.

"I remember that he was a little shocked that we had come to him and (he) asked us why we were reviewing the case," Melifsky said. "I was a little shocked by his reaction because usually families are pretty happy to see we're reviewing cases again."

Melifsky said that Wilbert Abnev eventually agreed to the test and that in early 2005 it came back as a match.


"When we went back to arrest him he had changed his story from what he had said in 1978, which was that he hadn't been to the hotel," Melifsky said. "When we went to arrest him he admitted that he had killed Mona [Abney] but that it was by accident as part of some erotic asphyxiation."

In March a jury didn't buy to 27 years in jail. Melifsky said that Abney was sentenced under the 1978 guidelines as

"I have mixed emotions about the case," Melifsky said. "It's one case closed, but there isn't really any closure, her family is still missing her, and there are 75 other cases that need to be closed and each case represents a family which is still missing a loved one."

Murder Trial Ordered For Man Defending Mother

Murder Trial Ordered

Murder charges against James D. Pritchett, 24, were advanced to Henry County Circuit Court this morning after two witnesses to the July 26 shooting of Roy Robertson testified that Pritchett shot Robertson without apparent provocation.

James W. Moyer, 16, and Anthony Weaver Hairston, 17, who were with Robertson on Virginia 615 when the farmer brought them and other workers to the site of a federally funded food program, told Judge Kenneth Covington at a hearing in Henry County General District Court that Pritchett fired three times into Robertson's truck.

The shooting followed an argument between Robertson and Pritchett's mother, Annie, about 30 minutes earlier that Pritchett had not heard. according to the two witnesses

Moyer testified that Mrs. Pritchett told Robertson "she didn't have enough food to go around," noting that other children were regularly fed there. An official of the program has said that "this is not a first come, first - served program." adding that meals are ordered on the basis of a count of children who ate the previous

Robertson, 68, was found dead by Henry County deputies who arrived at "The Gulf" area on Virginia 615 after the shooting. which apparently occurred between noon and 12:45 p.m.

Mrs. Pritchett and another woman present at the scene. Brenda Martin, have said that Pritchett accidentally shot Robertson after Robertson fired a rifle wildly into a crowd of children that afternoon

But Hairston and Moyer said today that Pritchett arrived after the argument between his mother and Robertson, stopped for a minute or less, left and returned again. When he came back he brought a rifle from his truck, walked to the passenger's

Police have found at least two bullet holes inside the truck in addition to several spent shell casings, but Moyer testified he did not know whether that evidence resulted from Robertson's firing a gun.

Police previously had termed the incident a "shoot-out."

Robertson, a tobacco and fruit farmer, had taken Moyer, Hairston and five other young field workers in his truck to get lunch from a food truck that came daily to the site in front of Mrs. Pritchett's house on Virginia 615, Moyer and Hairston testified.

Both witnesses said Robertson always provided their lunch but had never taken the two of them to the food truck before.

Robertson and the boys waited for several minutes at the Gulf until the food truck arrived, and then Robertson got out unarmed and spoke with Mrs. Pritchett, the site supervisor for the program, the two boys testified today.

Mrs. Pritchett and Robertson began "fussing about who gets the food, who don't get the food. and Roy told her anybody who lives in Henry County is supposed to get the food free." recalled Mover.

Mrs. Pritchett next told Robertson that "she had not forgotten about the time he (Robertson) had hit her son or brother in the head with a hammer," Moyer testified.

They continued to argue Hairston added, saying that both were "cussing" and raising their voices.

Robertson then walked back to his pickup truck and took out his 22 caliber rifle, pointing the muzzle at the ground, Hairston and Moyer said. Moyer said Robertson returned to the truck with the rifle but Hairston said Robertson only removed it for a moment and then climbed back inside the truck.

Robertson and his workers remained in the truck while Mrs. Pritchett told an unidentified woman to call the police, saying Robertson was holding a gun on her, Moyer

About that time Pritchett drove up for the first time and Hairston testified that Mrs. Pritchett yelled at her son. telling him to "go on."

Pritchett left but returned five to 10 minutes later and disembarked with his rifle. according to Hairston and

The shooting occurred shortly afterward and again only one person spoke to Pritchett; according to Hairston: Mrs. Pritchett yelled, "Don't shoot him," the youth testified.

Pritchett then spoke to Robertson, "then he started shooting," said Hairston.

Pritchett felon in '78 death

James D. Pritchett — a man charged Sunday with two counts of murder in the shooting deaths of his estranged wife and her boyfriend — had killed before, court records show.

Yorkshire Road, Martinsville, admitted shooting Roy Grey Robertson, a farmer, in a dispute on July 26, 1978. He pleaded guilty to second-degree murder under a plea agreement and received 15 years in prison on that charge. He also received an additional year in prison on a related charge of use of a firearm in the commission of a felony, according to Henry County Circuit Court records.

He served four years' active prison time for the killing, according to a state corrections official.

Karl Hellriegel, chief of the area office of the Virginia Department of Corrections Parole and Probation, said Pritchett was paroled in 1984.

"He served about four years," Hellriegel explained. "Back in those days, it was one-fourth of your time before you became eligible."

According to Hellriegel, Pritchett was no problem while on parole.

"He was released from parole in October of 1989; his parole was finished. That was the last we heard of him, back in '89," the parole chief said.

Robertson, a farmer whose lands ran near the Henry County line not far from Pittsylvania County, was shot in an argument with See PRITCHETT, Page 2-A Charge upgraded to capital murder

A first-degree murder charge was upgraded to a capital murder charge Friday in the case of a Martinsville man arrested in the deaths of his estranged wife and her male friend.


The change means James D. Pritchett will face a preliminary hearing on a charge that could send him to the electric chair.

Henry County Commonwealth Attorney Bob Bushnell said the charges against Pritchett, 40, of 1161 Yorkshire Road, were upgraded because the law allows two related first-degree murder charges to be tried as one capital murder charge and one first-degree murder charge.

A person convicted of capital murder faces either life in prison or death, Bushnell said. A person convicted of first-degree murder may be sentenced to 20 years to life in prison, he said.

Pritchett was arrested Nov. 6, hours after the slaying that left the pair dead. He also is charged with possession of a firearm after being a convicted felon, use of a firearm in the commission of a felony in relation to the murder of Germaine Pritchett, and use of a firearm in the commission of a felony in the murder of Jerry Wayne Dickerson.

Police later confirmed that the Pritchetts' 6year-old daughter watched the slaying. The girl was with her father when he was taken into custody hours after the deaths, according to Hen-See CHARGE, Page 2-A

Grand jury issues murder charges

A grand jury indicted a 40-yearold Martinsville man on capital and first-degree murder charges Monday in Henry County Circuit Court.

James Donald Pritchett, 1161 Yorkshire Road, is charged in the slaying of his estranged wife, Germaine Pritchett, 33, and her male friend, Larry Wayne Dickerson, 43, on the afternoon of Nov. 6.

At a preliminary hearing on Dec. 22, Pritchett's 6-year-old daughter, Nicole, provided an eyewitness account of the slayings.

She testified that her father shot her mother while she was sitting in a car with Dickerson outside a mobile home at Kings Mill Trailer Park in Ridgeway. Dickerson was shot as he tried to flee on foot.

Pritchett faces charges of first-degree murder in the death of Germaine Pritchett and capital murder for Dickerson. He also is charged with two counts of using a firearm in the commission of murder, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and shooting into an occupied vehicle. He could be sentenced to life in prison or death by lethal injection if convicted on the capital murder charge.

A first degree murder charge can be upgraded to capital murder — which is punishable by death — when more than one slaying takes place.

Seven-year-old Nicole Pritchett told a Henry County jury Tuesday that her father gave her a dollar bill so she would stop crying, after he stepped from his car to shoot her mother and a male friend execution-style.

Perched on the edge of the witness chair in striped shorts and blue Keds tennis shoes, her braided hair ornamented with white ribbons and beads, the girl smiled at her questioner and told the jury how her father killed her mother.

Her father, James Donald Pritchett, 41, is charged with the capital murder of Jerry Wayne Dickerson, 43, of Eden, N.C., and the first-degree murder of Pritchett's estranged wife, Germaine Pritchett, 33. He also is charged with two counts of using a firearm in the commission of a murder, shooting into an occupied vehicle and possession of a firearm by a convicted

He faces the death penalty if convicted of capital murder.

Attorneys' opening statements center on premeditation, passion

Henry County Commonwealth Attorney Robert Bushnell told the jury that James Pritchett and his wife. Germaine, had signed a separation agreement eight months prior to her fatal shooting, and that theirs was a marriage "in name only."

Pritchett, 41, is charged with capital murder and first-degree murder in the Nov. 6, 1994, slaying of his estranged wife and her male friend, Jerry Wayne Dickerson, at a mobile home park in Ridgeway.

In opening arguments Tuesday, On Saturday, the day before the shooting, Germaine Pritchett, 33, and Dickerson, 43, had attended a family party hosted by her sister, Gail Wanda France, in Kings Mill Trailer Park, located off Garrett Road at the southern end of Henry County. The two arrived in separate cars but left several hours later in Pritchett's car, Bushnell said in his opening state-

cally involved, he said, adding that "there is powerful circumstantial evidence that they spent the (Saturday) night together."

They did not return to the park until the next morning, he said.

About noon Sunday, shortly after Germaine Pritchett had driven up the gravel road in front of her sister's home, where Dickerson's car had been parked from the day before, James Pritchett arrived. He got out of his car, leaving his 6-year-old daughter, Nicole, in his car, and stood on the passenger side of his wife's Mazda and shot through the tinted glass at her and Dickerson, Bushnell said.

Germaine Pritchett died from a single gunshot wound that entered her upper arm and penetrated her chest. Dickerson died from a single gunshot wound to his neck. His body was found face down in a wooded area several hundred yards from the scene, Bushnell said, but evidence suggests he was shot while in the car.

Pritchett "willfully, deliberately and with premeditation killed them both," Bushnell said.

"The defense will ask you to

overlook all that" with a claim of heat of passion, he said, and asked the jury to consider how it was possible that Pritchett "drove to an isolated park in Henry County, to a dead-end spur and 'just happened upon' his estranged wife."

Defense attorney Patrick Sharpe said in his opening arguments that he did not dispute that James Pritchett killed his estranged wife and friend.

Determining "why it happened is your job," he told the jury.

Pritchett killed Dickerson in a split-second fit of rage, fear and jealousy, Sharpe said - "suddenly, quickly and in anger. He had no intention whatsoever to harm his wife, he will tell you."

Pritchett drove to the Ridgeway mobile home I ark in search of his wife, because she had not collected their daughter, Nicole, the previous evening as planned, Sharpe said.

Nicole lived with her mother and grandmother in Martinsville but visited her father in Henry County on weekends.

"James didn't "eally ant to go over there," he said, but went at Nicole's request. "Bushnell didn't son was still moving, trying to

tell you they went over there twice.

The first time, Pritchett pulled up to France's residence and honked his horn, but no one was home, Sharpe told the court.

"If you're going to kill somebody, are you going to blow your horn two times first?" he asked the jury.

When Pritchett returned some time later, after taking Nicole to breakfast at a Biscuitville in Eden, N.C., he saw his wife's Mazda but could not see through its tinted windows if anyone was inside.

Pritchett got out of his car and noticed Dic'terson in the passenger seat - a man he'd never seen before - and he asked his wife to step out of the car, Sharpe said.

"Dickerson sayı, 'she's not your wife anymore,' and starts cursing and says, 'I'll kill you,' and started moving in the car toward the glove compartment," Sharpe said.

In a state of shock, Pritchett left the park with Nicole and dropped her at a relative's home. Less than two hours after the shooting, he turned himself in at the Henry County Sheriff's Office, he told the

"It was heat of passion. It couldn't be capital murder," Sharpe

The defense entered as evidence several crude crayon drawings by Nicole to her father, which carried scrawled messages that she loved and missed him.

"There is no stronger love in this world than a parent's for his children. That is the strongest evidence in this case that it was not premeditated. He never intended this to happen," Sharpe said.

Pritchett gets life sentences

James Donald Pritchett was sentenced to two life terms in prison Tuesday for the murders of his wife and her male friend in November.

Pritchett, 41, was convicted in June of the capital murder of Jerry Wayne Dickerson and the first-degree murder of Pritchett's estranged wife, Germaine Pritchett. A Henry County Circuit Court jury returned a verdict recommending life imprisonment rather than the death penalty.

Circuit Court Judge David Williams upheld the jury's recommendation and imposed the sentence Tuesday.

A remaining charge of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon was nolle prossed, or abandoned by the prosecution.

Proving the firearm charge essentially would require a retrial, which Henry County Commonwealth Attorney Robert Bushnell explained would be a waste of resources and emotionally devastating to the families involved.

The offense carries a maximum punishment of five years in prison.

Before the trial, the defense asked that Pritchett be tried separately on this firearm charge because it was prejudicial to tell a jury up front that Pritchett had a criminal history.

Pritchett objected to the dropped charge, telling Williams he wanted to be retried because he had nothing to lose.

Bushnell said after the hearing that the five-year sentence tacked onto the two life sentences would not have affected Pritchett's parole eligibility.

Pritchett will receive his first hearing for parole eligibility in 25 to 30 years.

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Woman Dies After Elevator Mishap

Tobacco Worker Killed In Mishap At Factory Here

A 19-year-old colored leaf factory worker was killed early today when her head was crushed by an elevator at the Imperial Tobacco Company plant on Craghead street.

The victim was Margie Ree Martin, whose home is in the West Fork community on the Martinsville Highway, according to Patrolman R. S. Hall, one of the investigating officers.

The girl was crushed as the freight elevator moved between the third and fourth floors of the plant. She was alone on the carrier at the time and position of the body indicated that she was leaning over looking down on the floor below as the elevator moved upward.

The accident occurred about 12:45 p. m. during supper hour at the factory. The girl was employed in the hanging room in another section of the plant.

Officer Hall said he learned the girl had been across Craghead street to a restaurant and returned to the plant with several other workers.

She left her friends, went to the elevator and started up. Seconds later, those who remained on the main floor heard a scream. They rushed to the shaft, looked up and saw the girl's head caught. The young worker was dead.

Girl Crushed By Elevator At Factory

Tobacco Worker Loses Her Life

Margie Ree Martin, 19-year-old colored tobacco worker, was instantly killed at 12:45 o'clock this morning in an elevator accident at the Imperial Tobacco Company plant on Craghead Street where she was employed.

The girl, whose home is in the West Fork community on the Martinsville Road, was crushed as the freight elevator moved between the third and fourth floors of the plant during supper hour.

Patrolman R. S. Hall, one of the investigating officers, said that she was alone and that the position of the body indicated that she was leaning over and looking down on the floor below as the elevator moved upward, crushing her against the fourth floor.

Officer Hall said that the girl had just left a group of other workers shortly after returning from a restaurant across the street. The workers below, attracted by a scream, rushed to the shaft, looked up and saw that the girl's head had been caught. She was already dead when assistance reached her.

What Really Happened To Margie Martin?

New Version Of Elevator Tragedy Given

Continuing an investigation into an elevator tragedy at the Imperial Tobacco Company plant early Wednesday, detectives have learned that the circumstances are different from the first versions.

Margie Ree Martin, 19-year-old colored girl, lost her life when her head became wedged between the floor of the ascending elevator and the third floor of the building.

At first other workers said she was alone on the elevator at the time.

Working throughout last night on the investigation, Detective Capt. Thornton Link and Detective Frank Chaney secured an entirely different version. However, they added, no foul play is involved, nor suspected.

The officers said they determined that another girl was with the victim on the elevator at the time proceeding to a top floor, where they were to be met by two boys

Elevator Death Probe Continues With New Version

Circumstances surrounding the death of Margie Ree Martin, 19, colored, who lost her life at the Imperial Tobacco Company plantearly Wednesday, have proved to be different from the first versions.

The young girl was fatally injured when her head became wedged between the floor of an elevator and a floor of the building

At first it was said that the victim was alone on the elevator at the time of the tragedy.

Danville detectives who have been working on the case now have learned that another girl was on the elevator at the time it was proceeding to a top floor, where they were to be met by two boys who were going up by stairway.

The officers, including Detective Captain Thornton Link and Detective Frank Chaney, theorized that the Martin girl peered out to see if the boys were coming. Her head apparently became wedged between the side floor of the elevator and the side of the building floor.

At this point, the officers said. the machine stopped. The girl called out "Help me get out," at least twice. The boys by this time reached that floor via the stairway and one of them, trying to do something to liberate the girl, pulled the rope which sent the elevator moving downward again. This time her head struck a protruding spike, doing most of the damage to the side of her head. The elevator was stopped again. Coroner Dr. H. A. Wiseman told the officers the girl suffered a broken neck in addition to the gaping wound believed to have been made by the spike. However, there was no way to determine if this happened during the ascendency of the elevator or when it was started downward again.

Capt. Link said last night that he talked with one of the two boys, Russell Pritchett, again yesterday. The youth admitted, Link said, that after the girl became wedged by the elevator he ran the lift down and then back up in an effort to free the girl.

He claimed that he was only trying to help the victim and didn't realize that he may have been injuring her still more.


